Pastor's Message

No story in the history of the world has more significance than the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus. Beginning with Ash Wednesday, the season of Lent starts to draw us into that story. Like a strong current of a river or stream in the spring pulls the debris to a destination, Lent pulls us towards the re-telling of the most amazing event in God's history.

There are many things we can do during the season of Lent. Some believers embark on acts of self-denial, which are supposed to be done to mildly imitate that which Jesus engaged in as he denied himself and willingly went to the cross. Giving up things that we like during Lent is meant to remind us of his suffering more than dwelling on our own minor inconveniences.

Others try the opposite approach and use the season to engage in positive things that come from the faith by which we live. We can decide to help out a new charity, or discipline ourselves to greater devotional time in the study of scripture or religious reading, or we can pledge to be more deliberate in our prayer time. These and other good works are things that help us to grow deeper in our faith and in God's love for us; a love that Jesus' resurrection reminds us is ours too.

But there is the one thing that I don't advise you to do – that is, don't stand on the shore and let the current of Lent pass you by. Don't be passive or resistant to the practices that I mentioned. People of God have been doing them for centuries because these are good ways to be stronger in your faith. They are ways by which we can grow to love God and our neighbor more fully than before. Besides, to just show up Easter morning to celebrate Jesus' resurrection without taking part in some discipline of Lent, is sort of like celebrating a team's Super Bowl win without having been there for them all season long.

So I hope to see you in worship during Lent and I pray that you use the season to help you to get to know Jesus the Christ a little bit better.

Free the Slaves

Human trafficking is a form of modern-day slavery where people profit from the control and exploitation of others. It is considered to be one of the fastest growing criminal industries in the world and there may be as many as 27 million people in slavery today. As defined under U.S. federal law, victims of human trafficking include children involved in the sex trade, adults age 18 or over who are coerced or deceived into commercial sex acts, and anyone forced into different forms of "labor or services," such as domestic workers held in a home, or farm-workers forced to labor against their will. Every year, human traffickers generate billions of dollars in profits by victimizing millions of people around the world, and here in the United States.

This is a social problem of such magnitude and atrocity that it cannot be dealt with successfully by any government alone. This is why international associations, non-governmental organizations, and individuals around the world have joined together in the fight against modern slavery. One of these organizations working to eliminate human trafficking and modern day slavery is *Free the Slaves*.

Free the Slaves wants to end slavery in our lifetime. *Free the Slaves* works with liberators on the frontlines who risk their lives to bring slaves to freedom. They literally knock down doors and help slaves escape. But they also help survivors rebuild their lives, and work for systemic solutions.

They promote holistic, sustainable solutions that are developed by community members themselves. They help communities assert their basic rights. *Free the Slaves* educates, motivates, activates—helping people discover their unique role in this great endeavor. They share strategies, stories and lessons learned with state of the art technology, including the world's largest free video library on modern-day slavery. Ending slavery requires real change in governments and at the cash register. *Free the Slaves* takes what we learn in the field to demand that governments, international organizations and businesses do the right thing: Enforce existing laws and clean slavery out of product chains.

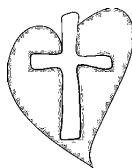
DISCIPLESHIP, FELLOWSHIP, COMMUNITY and SERVICE OPPORTUNITIES
