# A Note From Pastor Hutchinson

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## Patron Saint of Ireland

I know that the color for Lent is Purple, but I want you to think for a minute in terms of the color GREEN, as in the color that is found everywhere on St. Patrick's Day.

This year, St. Patrick's Day falls on the Monday in Holy Week and so within the Christian Church our fixtures will be draped in Scarlet, to remind us of the blood that Christ shed for us and for our sins, that we may have forgiveness. But the green of St. Patrick's Day ought to remind us of his story,...a story of forgiveness.

You see, Patrick was born in Britian (not Ireland!) to a rather well off family and was living comfortably when, while still a young man, he was kidnapped by Irish marauders. They sold him into slavery back in Ireland, where he was forced to work in captivity for six years until he was able to escape. Upon his escape, he returned to Britian where he eventually rose to the level of Bishop within the Church.

But what Patrick is most famous for is his willingness to return to the land of his captors and oppressors as a missionary for the Church. You see, at the time when he lived (in the fifth century) Ireland was still a dangerous and pagan worshipping land. Patrick, though, took his strong faith in God and combined it with his knowledge of the people of Ireland and converted that people with the good news of God's saving grace in Jesus Christ. As a result, he eventually became the Patron Saint of Ireland.

And yet, Patrick could have never gone there and graced the people of that island with God's blessing, if he had not first found it in his heart to forgive that land and its people for what they did to him. He allowed the Spirit of God to use



his ability to forgive and combined that with his other abilities and his faith, for the good of those people.

And so with Patrick, as with the cross of Christ, God once again brought something good out of the bad that happened. Good for Patrick as well as the people he served.

In this season of Lent, and as the celebration of the Resurrection approaches, we are most intensely reminded of the forgiveness we receive in Christ. Why not find it in your heart to forgive somebody who has harmed or offended you. God promises that surely good will come from it.

### Lenten Soup Suppers

During the season of Lent, we are again holding our traditional mid-week Lenten soup and salad suppers prior to worship. We will be inviting the Rejoicing Spirits folks to the meal on March 12.

**Meals are served at 6 p.m. and services begin at 7 p.m. each Wednesday up until Holy Week.** Each year we enjoy a delicious variety of soups, along with wonderfully fresh and creative salads and good breads. In keeping with the spirit of self-denial of earthly pleasures during Lent, there will be no desserts provided at the suppers, but the meals themselves are wonderful enough and nobody will be disappointed! Visitors are welcomed, so bring with you anyone who would like to come.



March's Rejoicing Spirits will again be incorporated into a regular Wednesday night Lenten worship service. We hope that many of the regular Rejoicers will join all us for worship. Our next regular Rejoicing Spirits worship will be on April 9<sup>th</sup> at 7 p.m.

### Palm/Passion Sunday 2008

March 16<sup>th</sup>

Worship at 8 and 10:45 a.m.



This year we will be celebrating Palm/Passion Sunday with two services that will include special music by our choirs. We will also once again make use of the eco-palms, which are full palm branches. Because of the palm procession, we will **first gather for worship in Horn Hall and then proceed to the narthex.** We plan to sing the "Palms" and worship will also have a dramatic reading of the Passion according to St. Matthew. Please come and worship on this special Sunday and invite your friends and neighbors.

**Events and Worship in Holy Week**  
**Thursday, March 20<sup>th</sup>**  
**Seder Meal at 6 p.m.**

Come celebrate our Judeo-Christian roots at the Seder Meal. Passover is the oldest religious festival in Judaism, commemorating God's deliverance of the Hebrews from slavery in Egypt and his creation of the Israelite people. The focal point of Passover is a communal meal, called the Seder (which means "order," because of the fixed order of service), which is a time of rejoicing and celebration at the deliverance of the Hebrews that God accomplished in the exodus. The Seder ritual also has great meaning for Christians. It was the Seder Meal that Jesus was celebrating with His disciples when He instituted the Last Supper.

Please **sign up in Horn Hall by March 16** if you plan to attend. There is a **separate sign up if you would like to contribute foods, help with set up, serving or cleanup.** Maundy Thursday worship will immediately follow the Seder at 7 p.m.

**Maundy Thursday Worship**  
**March 20 at 7 p.m.**

There will be a Traditional Maundy **Thursday worship service at 7 p.m.**, with Holy Communion celebrated. At the end of the service, the altar will be stripped to symbolize the stripping and humiliation of Jesus at the cross. **The Seder Meal precedes worship.**

One service will be held on **Good Friday at 7 p.m.** recognizing the day that Jesus was crucified.



**March 23<sup>rd</sup>**  
**The Resurrection of our Lord**

Worship with Holy Communion and special music, with a Potluck Breakfast in between services at 9:15 a.m.

There will be **no adult education or confirmation classes** on this day. An **Easter Egg Hunt with a devotion for children** will begin at 10:15 a.m.

**Sunday, March 23**



A potluck breakfast sponsored by the Sunday Morning Adult Education Classes will be held on Easter **Sunday, March 23 between the two worship services.** Also that morning will be an **Easter Egg Hunt with a devotion for children beginning at 10:15 a.m.**

## Third Sunday Offering

MARCH Recipient:  
**Pottstown Cluster of Religious  
Communities and the Feinstein Challenge**

The Pottstown Cluster of Religious Communities (PCRC) provides **various forms of assistance to people in need in the Greater Pottstown Area**. Resources for the work of PCRC come from different sources including the United Way, the religious communities, individuals, civic organizations and businesses. All funds raised and all donations collected are greatly appreciated and enable this organization to fulfill its mission.

Raising funds can be a difficult task so PCRC looks for ways to maximize the donations received. That is why PCRC is once again participating in the Feinstein Challenge. For an eleventh straight year, Alan Shawn Feinstein will divide \$1,000,000 among hunger-fighting agencies nationwide using it to help them raise funds during March and April 2008.

**For all money and food items received by the Cluster from March 1 through April 30, 2008, PCRC is permitted to count the financial contributions in dollars and food donations as \$1 per item.** This information is then submitted to the Feinstein Foundation in early May and the Cluster receives a proportionate share of the \$1 million posted by Mr. Feinstein based on the amounts raised by all agencies in the country participating in the Challenge by the end of June.

Even though the Cluster does not receive a dollar-for-dollar match on the funds raised, the additional money still helps PCRC help others.

## Prayers - First Sunday of the Month

## Scholarship Fund Applications Available

A \$1000 a year scholarship is available to be given to youth as monies for college or post high school education. Allocation of the scholarship money will be dependent on the number of approved candidates as determined by the Scholarship Committee. Applications are available from the office and **must be submitted completed no later that March 15, 2008.**

The following criteria will be considered when granting these scholarships:

- \* Applicant must be an active member of St. James for a minimum of one year.
- \* Applicant must be active in St. James' ministries.
- \* Applicant must be a graduating Senior of their high school and are eligible to receive scholarship monies up to five years from their high school graduation date.
- \* Applicant must graduate with a minimum 2.5 GPA or its equivalent.
- \* Applicant must be accepted into or participating in a recognized program of studies (ex. college, junior college, community college, nursing school, trade school, etc.)
- \* Applicant must have a satisfactory record of school citizenship and attendance.
- \* Applicant may apply more than once for this scholarship if they met the above criterion.

Ted Baer explained that the dates we were leaning to, were not compatible dates with Biloxi Habitat. However, New Orleans has several builds going on this spring and we are now looking to go to the New Orleans area to work in 2008. Tentative dates for the trip are the weeks of April 19 through 26<sup>th</sup> and April 26 through May 3<sup>rd</sup>. As of this writing, the date has not been finalized with the New Orleans Habitat Group, but all the necessary paperwork has been filed. Hopefully we will have a confirmation soon so we can proceed with the planning.
